

Our contractors are working feverishly to complete the new fire alarm system at Lakeview Manor. Thank-you to all our Lakeview tenants for your continued patience.



All lodge sites had provided some wonderful events, entertainment, meals and gifts for the residents and staff to enjoy. THANK YOU to those that made this possible!


I can't wait to see where the next year brings us! Wishing you all nothing but happiness in the new year.


January 18th we had our annual fire alarm inspection.

### Spruce View Lodge Whitecourt







# Spruce View Lodge Whitecourt






On Thursday, Christmas came early for the seniors. While many had wished for just one item, each person received a bag full of gifts.

"It's awesome, just totally awesome. So thoughtful and caring. It's really great," resident Judy Skinner said. "We really appreciate it."



# Chateau Lac Ste Anne Onoway




Here we are almost into February, it's great to see a little more daylight each day.

Reminder to staff, our first department meeting will be held on January 24th at 1:30. We will be reviewing the newly approved Personnel Handbook at the meeting.







































































































#### Clive and Mildred Heeks



During all his coaching time he coached 2 players who proceeded to play in the NHL, Bruce McGreggor and Eddie Joyal. Clive has worked for CN Rail, he then went on to working for a fire prevention company in Edmonton. He liked it so much he then opened his own business doing Fire Prevention where he would travel across Alberta checking fire extinguishers to make sure they were charged. Clive started the Men's Golf League in Alberta Beach.

Mildred was born May 12, 1933 in Edmonton Alberta at the Royal Alexander Hospital. Mildred is the youngest of 4 siblings. Mildred had 3 brothers who all served in the Armed Forces; they always made it home from their duties however they have since passed away. Mildred's father passed away when she was 5 years old, her mother remarried a coalminer in Luscar Alberta. There was a time her step father took her in the coal mining car and showed her what they do in the mine. Mildred worked for Hudson's Bay Company, The Bissell Shelter where she ran their store downtown Edmonton. Once Mildred retired she went on to volunteering at the Alberta Beach Museum & Alberta Beach Seniors centre.

At the young age of 20 Clive married Mildred who was 18. During their engagement, Mildred had to get Clive's parent's permission to wed, however permission was not required for Mildred to get married. The two love birds married on September 1, 1951. As Mildred describes it, they have a handful of children; they have 4 girls and 1 boy and 15 great grandchildren. They raised their children in Edmonton then, when the kids left the coop in 1967 they decided to move to Alberta Beach where they bought a small cabin which they eventually demolished and Clive built them a beautiful home. They then made the commute to Edmonton for work; in all of 14 years of commuting to Edmonton they only ever missed 1 day of work and that was due to the terrible winter road conditions.

#### **Ed and Jeannette Patrick**



Ed always loved to work with horses, especially young colts teaching them tricks.

For work he did some pipelining and then worked at the consolidated gravel pit at Villeneuve for 31 years. He remembers a proud time when there was a fire at the nearby Hutterite Colony where he was called into action with his cat to help control and put out the dangerous fire!

Jeannette was born at the Wetaskiwin hospital on October 20, 1943. She was raised on the farm and was the youngest of nine. She went to school until Grade 9 then started a job working at the Army and Navy store in Edmonton. She remembers sewing and hanging fish nets that sometimes stretched out 300 ft for \$15.00 a week including her room and board. Those nets were then sent up to Great Slave Lake. Some of her hobbies include doing jigsaw puzzles, crosswords, sewing and upholstery and playing her guitar and singing her gospel music; something very dear to her heart. Her brother used to own the Calahoo General Store and she would often go out that way to visit Ed's sister Elsie who in turn introduced her to Ed and thus their relationship blossomed. (Well, truthfully Jeannette fell in love with Ed's palomino horse first!)

Ed and Jeannette were married in 1961 and settled on 30 acres near Calahoo where they did some mixed farming. There, they raised their 2 children, Travis and Sheila in a little blue house that has now been turned into a cabin on Travis's property. Jeannette was a proud stay at home Mom and when Ed retired in 1999 they started taking short trips to Salmon Arm B.C. to visit family, Tucson to visit friends and then later they were involved in a group purchase of a quarter section of land near Clearwater B.C. where they vacationed for many years enjoying the mountain scenery, fishing and spending time with family and friends.
